Of the Creation

Of the Church

We believe that the church is a congregation of baptized believers associated by a covenant of faith and fellowship of the Gospel, said church being understood to be the citadel and propagator of the divine and eternal grace; observing the ordinances of Christ; governed by His laws; exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by His Word; that its officers of ordination are pastors or elders whose qualifications, claims, and duties are clearly defined in the scriptures.

We believe the true mission of the church is found in the Great Commission: first, to make individual disciples; second, to build up the church; third, to teach and instruct as He has commanded. We do not believe in the reversal of this order; we hold that the local church has the absolute right of self-government, free from the interference of any hierarchy of individuals or organizations; and that the one and only superintendent is Christ through the Holy Spirit; that it is scriptural for true churches to cooperate with each other in contending for the faith and for the furtherance of the Gospel; that every church is the sole and only judge of the measure and method of its cooperation; on all matters of membership, of policy, of government, of discipline, of benevolence, the will of the local church is final.

All courses that are implemented by RAM Bible Institute and Seminary are accredited by Accrediting Association of Bible Schools and Theological Institutions Inc., National Bible College Association and American Bible Colleges Accreditation who are authorized to grant Certificates, Bible Colleges and to award associate, bachelor's, master's, and doctoral degrees. Accrediting Association of Bible Schools and Theological Institutions Inc., National Bible College Association and American Bible Colleges Accreditation is an evangelical, faith based, accrediting agency.

The Courses that RAM Bible Institute and Seminary implements are fully accredited. Accrediting Association of Bible Schools and Theological Institutions Inc., National Bible College Association and American Bible Colleges Accreditation is a non-governmental accreditation, extended exclusively too private, Christian institutions upon inspection and approval of their programs, operations, and integrity.

They are a worldwide accreditation that honors the separation of church and state, and extends beyond national boundaries. Its standards and expectations measure compliance with scriptural principles as applied to education.

The Purpose of Accreditation Is To:

Certify that an institution has met the established standards of excellence assist prospective students in identifying reputable institutions, which offer degree programs that will meet their needs and goals allow institutions to evaluate the acceptability of transfer credits into their own curricula programs

In the United States, accreditation of universities and seminaries is a voluntary process with accreditation granted by private, non-governmental agencies. Governmental agencies do not provide theological or ministry accreditation.

Government-recognized accreditation is not necessary for the religious vocations in which we are equipping our students and people working in ministry positions do not need a government-accredited degree.

We do not prepare our students for secular work or denominational service. We will seek to provide a sound theological standing from which our students may fulfill their divine purpose and calling.

Our status as a Christian College is as follows:

Registered with the Secretary of State in Florida, USA Accredited with the Accrediting Association of Bible Schools and Theological Institutions Inc., National Bible College Association and American Bible Colleges Accreditation.

RAM Bible Institute & Seminary Degree Programs of Study have been declared by the appropriate State Authority exempt from the requirements for licensure, under provisions of Florida General Statutes Section 1005.06(1)(f) for exemption from licensure with respect to religious education.

Exemption from licensure is not based upon assessment of program quality under established licensing standards.

Us Department of Education Accreditation

RAM Bible and Institute and Seminary is not recognized by the U.S. Department of Education. Government recognized accreditation is not necessary for the religious vocations we are training people in, which include: Biblical Studies, Christian Arts, Christian Counseling, Christian Entrepreneurship, Christian Leadership, Divine Healing, Divinity, Intercessory Prayer, Ministry, Missions and Evangelism, Pastoral Ministry, Prophetic Ministry, Theology, Worship Ministry, and Youth Ministry. People can function and hold jobs in all of these professions without government-recognized accreditation.

Individuals seeking employment in government-licensed positions such as public school teachers, state-licensed psychologists or psychiatrists, and non-church-related counselors definitely need government-recognized accredited degrees. Generally, people working in ministry positions do not need a government-accredited degree. In fact, a number of churches take a stand against the Church voluntarily placing itself under government regulations.

LIFE EXPERIENCE

All degrees at the RAM Bible Institute and Seminary are earned degrees. This is achieved by mandatory coursework that must be completed.

Our courses are available to everyone who meets our entrance requirements. Our courses require comprehensive study and self-discipline as our Bible College is an online and offsite institution.

Bible College transcripts do not always reflect real life experience.

RAM Bible Institute and Seminary recognizes life experience which may have been gained through years of work which is ministry related, which could include such things as books authored, mission's trips, classes taught, outreach ministries, ministries within a church, etc., must be documented along with the years they occurred and submitted for evaluation.

Many people have served in ministry positions and have gained a lot of knowledge and experience in their fields, but do not have any formal certificate, Bible College, or degree. Life experience credits can give some of the recognition needed for this service in the work of the Lord. Applicants must have had more than five years in a recognized position in ministry. No Bible Colleges or degrees can be awarded based purely upon life-experience.

This acceptance of life credits helps a potential student to accelerate their learning college experience and enabling them to earn a fully accredited degree. Students may be eligible to receive legitimate college credit for their life experience and hands-on ministerial service through Ram Bible Institute & Seminary assessment degree program. Ram Bible Institute & Seminary does not want this experience to go unrecognized or unrewarded.

Applicants will be required to submit a detailed portfolio, resume, training certificate, proof of participation at seminars, major literary works, Sunday school training certificates and or any other documents of completion to be evaluated for assessment.

ADMISSIONS

Admission to RAM Bible Institute and Seminary is based on the student's ability to satisfactorily complete the academic requirements. Other factors such as the individual's Christian experience, call to ministry, and moral character are also taken into account. A non-refundable application fee of \$50 is required. Credit Transfers

Students wishing to transfer credits to other schools are responsible for finding out about the acceptance of credit by the receiving institution.

ACADEMIC PROGRAMS

RAM Bible Institute and Seminary definition of a credit hour is consistent with the Carnegie Unit; “one hour of classroom or direct faculty instruction and a minimum of two hours of out of class student work each week for approximately 15 weeks for one semester or trimester hour of credit, or ten to twelve weeks for one quarter hour of credit, or the equivalent amount of work over a different amount of time”.

RAM Bible Institute and Seminary offers academic programs designed disciples of Christ for Christian ministry. Each program is designed to help develop Spirit anointed leaders for Christian ministry through rigorous learning experiences that allow them to study and practice under the anointing of the Holy Spirit, and the mentorship of a highly qualified and talented faculty. RAM Bible Institute and Seminary is designed for Christians who want to learn the Bible and live out the teachings of Christ. The academic programs are built on the fundamentals of the Christian faith but recognize the diversity that exists among God loving believers who accept the Bible as the inerrant, infallible, and inspired Word of God, and Christ Jesus as the only Savior.

CERTIFICATE PROGRAM

The Certification program is designed for those applicants who have limited or no undergraduate college credit but have a burning desire to serve in ministry. The Certification program grants an Associate of Biblical Studies Degree. The students will receive their certificates as they finish each module and an Associate of Biblical Studies degree upon the completion of 8 Modules (60 Credit hours). The cost for each Module is FREE, but there's a \$ 249.00 Administrative Fee per Module.

MODULE 1 - CERTIFICATE IN BIBLE TEACHING (7.5 Credits)

1. CF107 - Creative Bible Study Methods

This course equips students for personal study of the Word of God. Students learn how to study the Bible by book, chapter, paragraph, verse, and word. Other methods taught include biographical, devotional, theological, typological, and topical. Special guidelines for studying Bible poetry and prophecy are presented, and methods of charting and outlining are taught. 1.5 Credit

2. CF203 - Bible Teaching Methods

This course examines the methods Jesus used to teach and preach the Gospel. Students are taught how to prepare and present lessons and how to teach and preach the Gospel. 1.5 Credit

3. CF309 - Knowing Gods Voice

This course explains how God speaks to man and how to find God's will for your life. Guidelines are given on knowing the voice of God and determining His will. The pattern of God's will and Scriptural examples of how God reveals His will are discussed. 1.5 Credit

4. CF302 - Power Principles

Power principles taught in this course will enable you to experience the spiritual power taught in the Bible. This course answers the heart cry of those who have hungered for reality instead of religion. It will move you from being a spectator to a demonstrator of the power of God. 1.5 Credit

5 CF504 - How We Got Our Bible

Most Christians understand that the Bible they hold in their hands is the inspired Word of God. Yet very few have a general understanding of the origin of the Bible. The purpose of this class, therefore, is to show the student how the Bible

came to be and why it can be accepted as the unerring, authoritative Word of God. 1.5 Credit

MODULE 2 - CERTIFICATE IN BIBLICAL STUDIES (7.5 Credits)

1. CF104 - Old Testament Survey

This survey provides an overview of the Old Testament. Study outlines of each book of the Bible is provided for further development by the student. 1.5 Credits

1. CF105 - New Testament Survey

This survey provides an overview of the New Testament. Study outlines of each book are provided for further development by the student. 1.5 Credits

2. CF106 - Strategies for Spiritual Harvest

This course explains how to expand the vision you have received by sharing with others what you have learned. You will learn how to train laborers for spiritual harvest who will be able to train others also. 1.5 Credits

3. CF505 - Bible Introduction 101

The aim of this course is to start with the proposition that belief, or indeed unbelief, cannot be exercised unless there is comprehension of the truth of the Bible. This course will teach the student the truth about the Bible in a summary manner and learn its anatomy and the truth contained in Scripture. 1.5 Credits

4. CF516 - The Names of Jesus

To really know God, you must get to know Him by name. The names of God in Scripture are really a self-revelation of God in His nature and attributes. The sheer number of such names and titles in Scripture suggest something of the immensity of God. The Bible identifies more than 700 descriptive names and titles of Jesus Christ. This study will help the student to get to know Jesus Christ more fully by studying several of His key names and titles. 1.5 Credits

MODULE 3 - CERTIFICATE IN CHRISTIAN LEADERSHIP (7.5 Credits)

1. CF204 Biblical Leadership Principles

A review of Biblical management principles with emphasis on servant leadership, Biblical leaders, and Scriptural strategies for success. 1.5 Credits

2. CF210 - Healing Ministry

In this course we are making a careful evaluation of the strategies available to win the war against Satan in the battle for your body. You will learn to do battle for your physical body and to minister these truths to other wounded warriors in God's army. 1.5 Credits

3. CF200 - Ministry of the Holy Spirit

This study focuses on the ministry of the Holy Spirit, spiritual fruit, and spiritual gifts. Students are guided in discovery of their own spiritual gifts and position of ministry in the Body of Christ. 1.5 Credits

4. CF520 - Jail and Prison Ministry

This class provides instruction for every level of involvement: The minimal level of corresponding with an inmate, visiting one-on-one with inmates, ministering in group worship services, special programs, or Bible studies inside an institution, assisting inmate's families, providing post-prison ministry upon an inmate's release from a penal institution. 1.5 Credits

5. CF312 - Women - A Biblical Profile

This course summarizes all the Bible teaches regarding women. It is not only a study guide, but a reference tool as it list all the passages about women and references to all the individual women mentioned in the Word of God. 1.5 Credits

MODULE 4 - CERTIFICATE IN CHRISTIAN MINISTRY (7.5 Credits)

1. CF100 - Guide to Intercessory Prayer

This course is an introduction to the ministry of intercessory prayer as given in James 5:16, "The effective, fervent prayer of a righteous man avails much."
1.5 Credits

2. CF201 - Spiritual Warfare

The entire record of God's Word, the Bible, describes men and women who faced difficult battles of life. In fact, the Apostle Paul describes life as a combat, conflict, and continual wrestling. This is the spiritual arena of life known as "spiritual warfare". 1.5 Credits

3. CF101 - Foundations of Faith

This course stresses the importance of proper spiritual foundations for life and ministry by focusing on foundations of the Christian faith identified in Hebrews 6:1: repentance, faith, baptism, laying on of hands, resurrection, and eternal judgment. 1.5 Credits

4. CF305 - Kingdom Living

This course concerns the Kingdom of God. It introduces the two spiritual kingdoms, their rulers, and residents. It provides spiritual keys for gaining access to the Kingdom of God and warns of things which result in being cast out of the Kingdom. The past, present, and future of this Kingdom are examined, Kingdom parables are explained, and its patterns and principles of living are stressed. 1.5 Credits

5. CF306 - Developing a Biblical World View

Three courses explain how to expand the vision you have received by sharing with others what you have learned. You will learn how to train laborers for spiritual harvest who will be able to train others also.

MODULE 5 - CERTIFICATE IN THEOLOGY (7.5 Credits)

1. CF516 - Biblical Theology

The word "theology" comes from two Greek words, theos meaning "God" and logos meaning "the word about" or "the study of" God as He is revealed in the Scriptures. Simply defined, theology is an in-depth study of the Holy Bible. The student will discover what God has said about Himself, His purposes, His plans, and His promises

2. CF506 - The Names of the Holy Spirit

To really know God, you must get to know Him by name. The names of God in Scripture are really a self-revelation of God in His nature and attributes. The sheer number of such names and titles in Scripture suggest something of the immensity of God. The Bible identifies more than 700 descriptive names and titles of Jesus Christ. This study will help the student to get to know Jesus Christ more fully by studying several of His key names and titles.

3. CF510 - Pneumatology

The word Pneumatology comes from two Greek words which mean "wind, air, spirit" and "word" - combining to mean "the study of the Holy Spirit." Pneumatology is the study of God the Holy Spirit, the third Person of the Trinity. The student will learn and answer important questions about the Holy Spirit and His work in the life of the believer.

4. CF515 - Soteriology

Soteriology is the study of the doctrine of salvation. Soteriology discusses how Christ's death secures the salvation of those who believe. The student will learn the meaning of the doctrines of redemption, justification, sanctification, propitiation, and the substitutionary atonement.

5. CF518 - Manners and Customs

Many passages of Scripture that are hard to understand, are readily explained by a knowledge of the customs and manners of Bible lands. The student will learn the Manners and Customs of Bible Lands

MODULE 6 - CERTIFICATE IN PRAYER & SPIRITUAL MINISTRY **(7.5 Credits)**

1. CF300 - Divine Provision

This book, "Divine Provision," will prepare you personally and your ministry corporately to face what is happening now and what will occur in the future in the financial realm. Your position in the face of the current and impending crises will not be one of weakness, but it will be a stance of strength, faith, and power, "For God hath not given us the spirit of fear; but of power, and of love, and of a sound mind" (2 Timothy 1:7).

2. CF308 - Battle for the Body

In this course we are making a careful evaluation of the strategies available to win the war against Satan in the battle for your body. You will learn to do battle for your physical body and to minister these truths to other wounded warriors in God's army.

3. CF408 - Prisoner of The Lord

This is a book for those doing time in jail or prison, whether short or lengthy sentences, life without parole, or on death row. It is for inmates, with portions written by and about inmates. It also teaches Christians how to minister to those incarcerated.

4. CF509 - Confronting Crisis

There are always "some" with a bad report. In fact, there are usually "more" than "some" because we live in a negatively oriented world. The student will learn what to do when you don't know what to do, using Biblical guidelines drawn from the story of King Jehoshaphat's battle with enemy forces recorded in 2 Chronicles 20.

5. CF514 - Strategic Spiritual Warfare

This course will dispel one lie of the enemy right up front. You are not alone in your struggles. The entire record of God's Word, the Bible, describes men and women who faced difficult battles of life. You will be given the tools to live a victorious life

MODULE 7 - CERTIFICATE IN EVANGELISM AND CHURCH PLANTING **(7.5 Credits)**

1. CF301 - Management by Objectives

"Management by Objectives" is a method for conducting Christian ministry in an orderly, effective manner. It is not enough to just know God's will for your life and ministry. You must make definite plans to fulfill your spiritual calling. You must learn to work with God to fulfill His purpose and plans.

2. CF303 - Methodology of Multiplication

This course shares Biblical methods of spiritual reproduction which will enable you to multiply in obedience to God's command. You will learn how to multiply spiritually as an individual and corporately within the context of the local church.

3. CF304 - Principals of Environmental Analysis

This course introduces principles of environmental analysis necessary for organizing and mobilizing spiritual resources for evangelizing. This study stresses the importance of environmental analysis in planning strategies to reach the world with the Gospel.

4. CF310 - Mobilization Methodologies

This course presents methods (a clearly defined way) of mobilizing believers to achieve spiritual harvest.

5. CF405 - Leaven Like Evangelism

In this course the student will learn about the mandate given by Jesus to preach the Gospel of the Kingdom and receive instruction on the message to be shared, the messengers of the Gospel, how to communicate the Gospel, and to whom it is to be communicated. The student will also learn many methods of evangelism, with emphasis on those used in New Testament times. Both personal and mass evangelism methods are discussed, with specific instruction on how to deal with difficulties in evangelizing and the follow-up care of new converts.

MODULE 8 - CERTIFICATE IN LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT AND SPIRITUAL FORMATION (7.5 Credits)

1. CF401 - Book Biblical Numbers

This study explains the importance of biblical numerology and provides guidelines for properly interpreting numbers. You will learn the meaning of selected numbers, their prophetic significance, and how to apply what you learn. These foundational studies will equip you to interpret the spiritual meaning of numbers used in scripture and provide the skills necessary for you to continue this fascinating study independently.

2. CF403 - Covenant of Abraham

A great story-but much more than a story. The student will learn a historical record of the birth of the nation of Israel. More than the story of one man. It is the story of a divine covenant the supernatural promises of God intended to pass from generation to generation, down through the centuries.

3. CF588 - Christian Leadership

Christian leadership is not a mysterious domain for a chosen few with a special gift of wisdom. Even if a you have no calling to a biblical office, the principles are available to all. This gives influence in the area of your gifts, with or without titles.

4. CF589 - Equipping For Leadership

This course deals with leadership which will incorporates both theory and practice in an equal balance and to look at the differences between worldly and Christian philosophies of leadership.

5. CF590 - CHURCH LEADERSHIP 101

This class will help the leader understand what you do and help you be a better, more effective, more understanding and stronger leader.

BACHELOR OF SCIENCE IN BIBLICAL STUDIES DEGREE

ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS

Prerequisite to enroll: A High School Diploma

Degree is granted upon successful completion of 120 credit hours.

1. BITH100 - INTRODUCTION TO THE BIBLE

This course traces the history of the Bible and includes discussions of inspiration, the biblical canon, major manuscripts, textual criticism, early translations, and modern versions. 3 Credits

2. BITH101 - UNDERSTANDING THE OLD TESTAMENT

A survey of the Old Testament. Emphasis is placed on the major themes, key scriptures, and major personalities of each book. Historical and literary backgrounds of the books are covered. 3 Credits

3. BITH102 - UNDERSTANDING THE NEW TESTAMENT

An introduction to the New Testament that examines major themes, broad divisions, key scriptures, major personalities, and the structure and context of each book. Literary and historical backgrounds are also examined. 3 Credits

4. BITH104 - PRAYING WITH POWER

This course aims at inspiring students; giving them the courage to pray for the impossible and helping them find the persistence to see their prayers to completion. 3 Credits

5. BITH105 - PERSONAL EVANGELISM AND DISCIPLEMAKING

This course will challenge students to commit themselves to the fulfillment of the Great Commission to "go make disciples of all the nations". A step-by-step guide to disciple making is proposed. 3 Credits

6. BTH106 - CHRISTIAN LIVING

This course introduces the student to patterns and principles of Kingdom living applicable to life and ministry. 3 Credits

7. BICM109 - PREPARING FOR CHRISTIAN MINISTRY

This course will help students discover their calling and inspire them to place their God given gifts at the Lord's disposal. Principles of biblical vision and spiritual leadership are covered so as to help students become powerful servants of the Almighty. 3 Credits

8. BITH107 - FOUNDATIONS OF LEADERSHIP

From Moses to the Lord Jesus, to the Apostles, the Bible is a great text on leadership. Basic principles of leadership and practical insights will be covered from a biblical perspective. 3 Credits

9. BITH103 - SUMMARY OF CHRISTIAN DOCTRINE

This course stresses the importance of a proper spiritual foundation for life and ministry by providing an overview of Bible doctrines identified in Hebrews 6:1: Repentance, faith, baptism, laying of hands, resurrection, and eternal judgment. 3 Credits

10. BITH200 - BIBLICAL HISTORY OF ISRAEL

The Bible tells the story of God's redemptive work in the life and death of Jesus Christ through the human history of the nation of Israel and the early church. This course helps the student pinpoint the place and time of major events in salvation history. 3 Credits

11. BITH202 - CHRISTIAN EDUCATION IN THE CHURCH

This course provides the student with biblical, historical, and theological foundations of Christian education. The student will be led to explore principles for an effective implementation of education programs in the local church. 3 Credits

12. BITH203 - THE GOSPELS

This course will review the historical Background of the Gospels, the message of the four Gospels, and the Life and ministry of Christ. 3 Credits

13. BITH204 - THE PENTATEUCH

The Pentateuch-Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers, Deuteronomy are the vital first books in the Bible. Understanding the scope, meaning, and events of these five books is integral to understanding the whole of Scripture that follows. 3 Credits

14. BITH205 - HISTORICAL BOOK

The background information and the major themes of the 12 historical books of the Old Testament are reviewed in greater detail. 3 Credits

15. BITH206 - BIBLICAL PREACHING 101

This course provides an overview of aspects of biblical preaching, including the development and delivery of biblical sermons. 3 Credits

16. BICM207 - NEW TESTAMENT ECCLESIOLOGY

Basic models of church government which have developed over the course of church history are presents. The student will be exposed to the biblical, historical, and theological underpinning of each church governance tradition. 3 Credits

17. BITH208 - FUNDAMENTALS OF BIBLICAL EXEGESIS

This course teaches students how to carefully read Scripture in the biblical context, and to dig deeper into the Word of God so they will be able to understand the Bible correctly and apply its meaning to their lives and ministries. 3 Credits

18. BITH209 - INTRODUCTION TO MISSIOLOGY

19. BINT300 - ACTS

Through a rigorous exposition of the book of Acts, students gain a greater understanding and appreciation of the early disciples' commitment to the fulfillment of the Great Commission. 3 Credits

20. BIOT301 - OLD TESTAMENT BOOKS OF POETRY

The poetic books of Job, Psalms, Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, and Song of Solomon are covered in detail. Historical Background information and theological themes of each book are outlined. 3 Credits

21. BINT302 - EPISTLES OF PAUL I

This course is a study of the ministry and teachings of the Apostle Paul as recorded in the Pauline Epistles. The life setting of each letter is related to Paul's journeys described in the book of Acts. Special attention is given to the major theological themes of the epistles. Part I covers the Book of Galatians through II Thessalonians. 3 Credits

22. BINT304 - ROMANS

This course will provide an in-depth and exegetical study of the Epistle to the Romans emphasizing its contribution to Christian theology and life. 3 Credits

36. BITH410A - SURVEY OF PASTORAL MINISTRY

37. CF506 - The Names of the Holy Spirit

To really know God, you must get to know Him by name. The names of God in Scripture are really a self-revelation of God in His nature and attributes. The sheer number of such names and titles in Scripture suggest something of the immensity of God. The Bible identifies more than 700 descriptive names and titles of Jesus Christ. This study will help the student to get to know Jesus Christ more fully by studying several of His key names and titles. 3 Credits

38. CF514 - STRATEGIC SPIRITUAL WARFARE

This course will dispel one lie of the enemy right up front. You are not alone in your struggles. The entire record of God's Word, the Bible, describes men and women who faced difficult battles of life. The student will be given the tools to live a victorious life. 3 Credits

39. CF590 - CHURCH LEADERSHIP 101

This class will help the leader understand what you do and help you be a better, more effective, more understanding and stronger leader. 3 Credits

40. CF504 - HOW WE GOT OUR BIBLE

Most Christians understand that the Bible they hold in their hands is the inspired Word of God. Yet very few have a general understanding of the origin of the Bible. The purpose of this class, therefore, is to show the student how the Bible came to be and why it can be accepted as the unerring, authoritative Word of God. 3 Credits

BACHELOR OF SCIENCE IN BIBLICAL STUDIES DEGREE

DOCTORAL PROGRAMS

Doctor of Philosophy Degree (PhD)
Doctor of Theology Degree (ThD)

Candidates will specialize in one of the fields of theological scholarship, such as: Hebrew Bible/Old Testament; New Testament and Early Christian Studies; History of Christianity; Systematic Theology; Ethics; Church Growth and Mission Studies.

Study for the degree of doctor of theology extends through three stages: Coursework, Knowledge Area Modules (KAM), and dissertation.

Candidates for this degree must fulfill the following:

6 credit hours of Course work
6 credit hours of Seminar: Theology: Oral and written presentation
24 credit hours of dissertation

ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS:

The applicant must have earned a master's degree in Divinity, Theology, or Biblical Studies.

1. THD890 INTRODUCTION TO THEOLOGICAL RESEARCH

This course will provide students with the tools for doctoral level research and opportunities for reflection on becoming scholar-pastor. Students are introduced to the conduct and reporting of scholarly theological research. 6 Credits

2. 6 credit hours of Seminar: Theology: Oral and written presentation. 6 Credits

3. 24 credit hours of dissertation. 24 Credits

DESCRIPTION OF COURSES

CF100 Guide To Intercessory Prayer

This course is an introduction to the ministry of intercessory prayer as given in James 5:16, "The effective, fervent prayer of a righteous man avails much."

CF101 Foundations of Faith

This course stresses the importance of proper spiritual foundations for life and ministry by focusing on foundations of the Christian faith identified in Hebrews 6:1: repentance, faith, baptism, laying on of hands, resurrection, and eternal judgment.

CF102 Kingdom Living

This course concerns the Kingdom of God. It introduces the two spiritual kingdoms, their rulers, and residents. It provides spiritual keys for gaining access to the Kingdom of God and warns of things which result in being cast out of the Kingdom. The past, present, and future of this Kingdom are examined, Kingdom parables are explained, and its patterns and principles of living are stressed.

CF103 Knowing Gods Voice

This course explains how God speaks to man and how to find God's will for your life. Guidelines are given on knowing the voice of God and determining His will. The pattern of God's will and Scriptural examples of how God reveals His will are discussed.

CF104 Old Testament Survey

This survey provides an overview of the Old Testament. Study outlines of each book of the Bible are provided for further development by the student.

CF105 New Testament Survey

This survey provides an overview of the New Testament. Study outlines of each book are provided for further development by the student.

CF106 Strategies For Spiritual Harvest

Course Description

Three courses explain how to expand the vision you have received by sharing with others what you have learned. You will learn how to train laborers for spiritual harvest who will be able to train others also.

CF107 Creative Bible Study Methods

This course equips students for personal study of the Word of God. Students learn how to study the Bible by book, chapter, paragraph, verse, and word. Other methods taught include biographical, devotional, theological, typological, and topical. Special guidelines for studying Bible poetry and prophecy are presented, and methods of charting and outlining are taught.

CF200 Ministry of the Holy Spirit

This study focuses on the ministry of the Holy Spirit, spiritual fruit, and spiritual gifts. Students are guided in discovery of their own spiritual gifts and position of ministry in the Body of Christ.

CF201 Spiritual Warfare – The Disciple’s Basic Training

The entire record of God’s Word, the Bible, describes men and women who faced difficult battles of life. In fact, the Apostle Paul describes life as a combat, conflict, and continual wrestling. This is the spiritual arena of life known as “spiritual warfare”.

CF202 Developing a Biblical World View

Three courses explain how to expand the vision you have received by sharing with others what you have learned. You will learn how to train laborers for spiritual harvest who will be able to train others also.

CF203 Bible Teaching Methods

This course examines the methods Jesus used to teach and preach the Gospel. Students are taught how to prepare and present lessons and how to teach and preach the Gospel.

CF204 Biblical Leadership Principles

A review of Biblical management principles with emphasis on servant leadership, Biblical leaders, and Scriptural strategies for success.

CF205 Strategies For Spiritual Multiplication

This course shares Biblical methods of spiritual reproduction which will enable you to multiply in obedience to God's command. You will learn how to multiply spiritually as an individual and corporately within the context of the local church.

CF206 Power Principles

Power principles taught in this course will enable you to experience the spiritual power taught in the Bible. This course answers the heart cry of those who have hungered for reality instead of religion. It will move you from being a spectator to a demonstrator of the power of God.

CF207 Spiritual Environmental Analysis)

This course introduces principles of environmental analysis necessary for organizing and mobilizing spiritual resources for evangelizing. This study stresses the importance of environmental analysis in planning strategies to reach the world with the Gospel.

CF208 Multiplication Evangelism

The initial call of Jesus Christ to men was to be spiritually reproductive: "Follow me, and I will make you fishers of men." His final command, that of the Great Commission, also challenged followers to spiritual reproduction. Using the analogy of the natural harvest, this course focus on promises of spiritual harvest, things that prevent harvest, and the keys to effective harvest. It communicates the vision which the remainder of Institute training equips student to fulfill.

CF209 Prison Ministry

This class provides instruction for every level of involvement: The minimal level of corresponding with an inmate, Visiting one-on-one with inmates, Ministering in group worship services, special programs, or Bible studies inside an institution, Assisting inmate's families, Providing post-prison ministry upon an inmate's release from a penal institution.

CF210 Healing Ministry

In this course we are making a careful evaluation of the strategies available to win the war against Satan in the battle for your body. You will learn to do battle for your physical body and to minister these truths to other wounded warriors in God's army.

Undergraduate Courses

BITH100 INTRODUCTION TO THE BIBLE

This course traces the history of the Bible and includes discussions of inspiration, the biblical canon, major manuscripts, textual criticism, early translations, and modern versions.

BIOT101 UNDESTANDING THE OLD TESTAMENT

A survey of the Old Testament. Emphasis is placed on the major themes, key scriptures, and major personalities of each book. Historical and literary backgrounds of the books are covered.

BINT102 UNDERSTANDING THE NEW TESTAMENT

An introduction to the New Testament that examines major themes, broad divisions, key scriptures, major personalities, and the structure and context of each book. Literary and historical backgrounds are also examined.

BITH103 SUMMARY OF CHRISTIAN DOCTRINE

This course stresses the importance of a proper spiritual foundation for life and ministry by providing an overview of Bible doctrines identified in Hebrews 6:1: Repentance, faith, baptism, laying of hands, resurrection, and eternal judgment.

BITH104 PRAYING WITH POWER

This course aims at inspiring students; giving them the courage to pray for the impossible and helping them find the persistence to see their prayers to completion.

BITH105 PERSONAL EVANGELISM AND DISCIPLEMAKING

This course will challenge students to commit themselves to the fulfillment of the Great Commission to “go make disciples of all the nations”. A step-by-step guide to disciple making is proposed.

BITH106 CHRISTIAN LIVING

This course introduces the student to patterns and principles of Kingdom living applicable to life and ministry.

BICM107 FOUNDATIONS OF LEADERSHIP

From Moses to the Lord Jesus, to the Apostles, the Bible is a great text on

leadership. Basic principles of leadership and practical insights will be covered from a biblical perspective.

BICM108 STARTING AND LEADING A SMALL GROUP

Small groups have the power to change lives. They're the ideal route to discipleship a place where the rubber of biblical truth meets the road of human relations. Students will receive practical guidance on how to start and lead effective small groups.

BICM109 PREPARING FOR CHRISTIAN MINISTRY

This course will help students discover their calling and inspire them to place their God given gifts at the Lord's disposal. Principles of biblical vision and spiritual leadership are covered so as to help students become powerful servants of the Almighty.

BITH200 BIBLICAL HISTORY OF ISRAEL

The Bible tells the story of God's redemptive work in the life and death of Jesus Christ through the human history of the nation of Israel and the early church. This course helps the student pinpoint the place and time of major events in salvation history.

BICM201 CHRISTIAN EDUCATION IN THE CHURCH

This course provides the student with biblical, historical, and theological foundations of Christian education. The student will be led to explore principles for an effective implementation of education programs in the local church.

BICM202 CHILDREN'S MINISTRY

After exploring the biblical and historical perspectives of children's ministry, the course covers such topics as children ministry programs administration, childhood development, discipline, learning styles, summer ministries, and more.

BINT203 THE GOSPELS

This course will review the historical Background of the Gospels, the message of the four Gospels, and the Life and ministry of Christ.

BIOT204 THE PENTATEUCH

The Pentateuch—Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers, Deuteronomy—are the

vital first books in the Bible. Understanding the scope, meaning, and events of these five books is integral to understanding the whole of Scripture that follows.

BIOT205 HISTORICAL BOOKS

The background information and the major themes of the 12 historical books of the Old Testament are reviewed in greater detail.

BICM206 PREACHING 101

This course provides an overview of aspects of biblical preaching, including the development and delivery of biblical sermons.

BICM207 INTRODUCTION TO CHURCH GOVERNANCE

Basic models of church government which have developed over the course of church history are presents. The student will be exposed to the biblical, historical, and theological underpinning of each church governance tradition.

BITH208 FOUNDAMNETALS OF BIBLICAL EXEGESIS

This course teaches students how to carefully read Scripture in the biblical context, and to dig deeper into the Word of God so they will be able to understand the Bible correctly and apply its meaning to their lives and ministries.

BICM209 INTRODUCTION TO MISSIOLOGY

“Missio Dei” is the idea that God is actively working to reconcile his creation to Himself through Jesus Christ. This course presents an overview of the theology of missions, as well as current trends in missions.

BICM210 FIELD MINISTRY

This course is designed to help students gain greater confidence and competence in the actual practice of those ministry skills that will be needed in the student’s anticipated ministry role. Mentoring is provided through both individual meetings with an experienced practitioner and peer ministry reflection groups.

BINT300 ACTS

The book of Acts, also referred to as the “Acts of the Apostles” or the “Acts of the Holy Spirit”, presents the exciting story of the beginning of the church. Through a rigorous exposition of the book of Acts, students gain a greater

understanding and appreciation of the early disciples' commitment to the fulfillment of the Great Commission.

BIOT301 OLD TESTAMENT BOOKS OF POETRY

The poetic books of Job, Psalms, Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, and Song of Solomon are covered in detail. Historical Background information and theological themes of each book are outlined.

BINT302 EPISTLES OF PAUL I

This course is a study of the ministry and teachings of the Apostle Paul as recorded in the Pauline Epistles. The life setting of each letter is related to Paul's journeys described in the book of Acts. Special attention is given to the major theological themes of the epistles. Part I covers the Book of Galatians through II Thessalonians.

BINT303 EPISTLES OF PAUL II

This course is a study of the ministry and teachings of the Apostle Paul as recorded in the Pauline Epistles. The life setting of each letter is related to Paul's journeys described in the book of Acts. Special attention is given to the major theological themes of the epistles. Part II covers I and II Corinthians, I and II Timothy, Titus and Philemon.

BINT304 ROMANS

This course will provide an in-depth and exegetical study of the Epistle to the Romans emphasizing its contribution to Christian theology and life.

BITH305 SYSTEMATIC THEOLOGY I

This course is an overview of the theological areas of prolegomena, revelation, theology proper, anthropology, and Christology.

BITH306 SYSTEMATIC THEOLOGY II

This is an overview of the theological areas of anthropology, Christology, and pneumatology.

BITH307 CHURCH HISTORY I

This course is an overview of how the Church's doctrine, faith, and practice developed from Pentecost to the time of the Protestant Reformation.

BITH308 CHURCH HISTORY II

This course is an overview of the development of the Christian church's doctrine, faith, and practice from the Protestant Reformation to the present.

BITH309 SPIRITUAL WARFARE AND DIVINE HEALING

This course moves participants beyond the natural world into the realm of the Spirit. Tactics of the enemy are analyzed and strategies of spiritual warfare assuring victory over the principalities and powers of the spirit world are explained. Guidelines for receiving and ministering healing will also be covered.

BICM310 FIELD MINISTRY

This course is designed to help students gain greater confidence and competence in the actual practice of those ministry skills that will be needed in the student's anticipated ministry role. Mentoring is provided through both individual meetings with an experienced practitioner and peer ministry reflection groups.

BICM400 CHURCH PLANTING IN THE 21ST CENTURY

This course will provide the student with an overview of the theology, theory, and practice of a church-planting ministry. Special attention will be given to a model of evangelism for church planting, to the Pauline cycle, and to contemporary models of church planting.

BITH401 SYSTEMATIC THEOLOGY III

This course is an overview of the theological areas of soteriology, ecclesiology, and eschatology.

BINT402 GENERAL EPISTLES

The course provides a close reading of James, I Peter, II Peter, I John, II John, III, and Jude with special attention given to literary, socio-historical and theological understandings of the epistles.

BITH403 REVELATION

A chapter by chapter exposition of Revelation. The various schools of interpretation are explained.

BICM404 PRINCIPLES OF CHURCH ADMINISTRATION

The purpose of this course is to help each student identify, understand and

develop the fundamental skills of church administration and leadership in a Christian setting.

BITH405 CHURCH HISTORY III

The goal of the course is to see the sovereign, merciful workings of God throughout American history and to gain insight into the state of Christendom today.

BIOT406 OLD TESTAMENT – MAJOR PROPHETS

This course is a study of the books of Isaiah, Jeremiah, Lamentations, Ezekiel and Daniel. Historical Background information and theological themes of each book are outlined.

BIOT407 OLD TESTAMENT – MINOR PROPHETS

This course is a study of the books of Hosea, Joel, Amos, Obadiah, Jonah, Micah, Nahum, Habakkuk, Zephaniah, Haggai, Zechariah and Malachi. Historical Background information and theological themes of each book are outlined.

BINT408 HEBREWS

This course is a detailed study of the Epistle to the Hebrews.

BITH409 BIBLICAL PREACHING - (HOMELETICS)

The principles and practice of crafting and delivering a biblical sermon will be outlined and demonstrated.

BITH410 CHRISTIAN WORSHIP

This course is a Study of the Principles and Practice of Biblical Worship.

GRADUATE COURSES

Old Testament Course Descriptions

BITH 506 Basic Hebrew

Essentials of biblical Hebrew grammar: orthography, morphophonemics, vocabulary; historical developments; readings and exercises.

BITH507 Hebrew Exegesis (The Book of Isaiah)

In addition to surveying the contents of the book, the course develops the understanding and skills of exegetical exposition.

New Testament Course Descriptions

BITH508 Basics of Biblical Greek

Prescribed for students without knowledge of Greek. Rudiments of NT Greek and basic vocabulary are learned; practice in reading.

BITH509 NT Exegesis I

Exegesis of a selected NT book with special attention given to Greek grammar and syntax of the text; prerequisite: Basic NT Greek.

BITH510 NT Exegesis II

Exegesis of a selected NT book with special attention given to Greek grammar and syntax of the text; prerequisite: Basic NT Greek.

Systematic Course Descriptions

BITH570 Foundations of Christian Theology

In addition to establishing a foundation of concepts and terminology of Christian theology, this course covers the essentials of all major areas of systematic theology with the goal of guiding students to the basic material necessary to understand and study God's Word.

BITH600 Apologetics

In this course, students compare biblical, historical, and recent approaches to defending faith in God, Christ, and Scripture.

BITH601 Contemporary Theology I

The course explores the theologies of Hegel, Kierkegaard, Barth, Bultmann, and Tillich.

BITH602 Contemporary Theology II

The course explores contemporary theologies, including Theology of Hope, Liberation Theology, Feminist Theology, Process Theology, New Age Theology, and Post-modern Theology.

Historical Studies Course Descriptions

BITH630 Church History to the Reformation

In this course, students discover how the Church's doctrine, faith, and practice developed from Pentecost to the time of the Protestant Reformation.

BITH631 Church History Since the Reformation

In this course, students survey the development of the Christian church's doctrine, faith, and practice from the Protestant Reformation to the present.

BITH632 The American Church

The birth of the European church in the new world; various groups and their leaders, and the rise of American cults; awakenings and New England theology, revivalism and the western frontier, the Civil War, the industrial revolution and social concerns; the World Wars, the modernist-fundamentalist controversy, the Sixties and the church in American government.

Church Ministry Course Descriptions

BITH700 Evangelism and Discipleship

A study in basic principles of personal evangelism; definition and biblical examples of evangelism; resources available for evangelism; memorization of key Scripture verses for evangelism; field experience in evangelism.

BITH703 Advanced Biblical Preaching

Theology of preaching; practice in all types of sermons; refining of personal style; includes preaching outside of class.

BITH533 Church Organization and Administration

Biblical basis of the church; its government and discipline; the offices, qualifications, and duties of church leaders; effective church management.

BITH534 Survey of Church Ministry

Biblical mandates and principles governing the task of the church in edifying and equipping the saints for service; the church and foreign missions; church planting; home and hospital visitation; religious education; worship; church ceremonies.

BITH535 Christian Worship and Church Revival

A biblical, historical, and contemporary look at gospel-centered worship with emphasis on understanding, planning, and leading corporate public worship in a local congregation. In addition, the dynamics of spiritual renewal are explored.

BITH537 Church Planting

Biblical and historical perspectives on church planting; starting new churches in the age of the Internet; steps and procedures for establishing a mission and developing it into an organized church; practical methods and techniques used in church planting.

Biblical Counseling Course Descriptions

BITH800 Introduction to Biblical Counseling

The nature and principles of biblical counseling, techniques and theories of counseling; patterns of problem solving, the counselor and counselee relationship; the sufficiency of Scripture; and biblical conflict resolution.

ACCREDITATION

The Purpose Of Accreditation Is To:

Certify that an institution has met the established standards of excellence assist prospective students in identifying reputable institutions, which offer degree programs that will meet their needs and goals allow institutions to evaluate the acceptability of transfer credits into their own curricula programs

In the United States, accreditation of universities and seminaries is a voluntary process with accreditation granted by private, non-governmental agencies. Governmental agencies do not provide theological or ministry accreditation.

Government-recognized accreditation is not necessary for the religious vocations in which we are equipping our students and people working in ministry positions do not need a government-accredited degree.

We do not prepare our students for secular work or denominational service. We will seek to provide a sound theological standing from which our students may fulfill their divine purpose and calling.

US Department Of Education Accreditation

USDE accreditation is not necessary for the theological degrees in which we offer. Individuals seeking employment in government-licensed positions such as public school teachers, state-licensed psychological or psychiatrist, and non-church-related counselors will more than likely need USDE accredited degrees. Generally speaking, people working in ministry positions do not need a USDE accredited degree. If you are pursuing education at our institution with the intent of obtaining employment outside of the Christian community or for some other reason, you should check with that organization BEFORE applying for enrollment in us. We assumes no liability of any kind.

Separation of Church and State

- There is secular education and there is religious education.
- Religious schools are not legally required to become accredited
- Secular schools seek secular education, and sacred schools receive sacred or ecclesiastic accreditation each by their own peers.
- Religious institutions need no secular accreditation because they offer no secular degrees.

- Secular accreditation associations in turn are recognized by governmental agencies. They trace their authority back to the capitol of a country, like Washington, D.C.
- Religious accrediting associations are recognized by the Church of Jesus Christ, which has no supreme central office on earth. Our authority is derived directly from Heaven.
- Civil and religious interest are different and have separate realms of jurisdiction.
- The State is not superior to the Church. The Church need not wait for approval from the secular world.
- Civil agencies should not be dictating standards of Christian education; any more than a police officer should be directing the worship of God.
- Theological Seminaries should not be accredited by accrediting associations that are "recognized" by an agency of the federal government,

because it is contrary to the Biblical principle of "Separation of Church and State," indicated by Christ when He said, "...Render unto Caesar the things that are Caesar's, and to God the things that are God's..." (Mark 12:17).

- What business does a Christian educator have going to the world of unbelievers for recognition and acknowledgement when 2 Corinthians 6:14 clearly tells us, "Be ye not unequally yoked together with unbelievers: for what fellowship hath righteousness with unrighteousness?"
- A Christian educational institution securing accreditation from an association which is attached to a governmental agency is a Scripturally condemned and unholy union as James 4:4 says, "Ye adulterers and adulteresses, know ye not that the friendship of the world is enmity with God?"

Why not become accredited by the Department of Education? In many cases the government's Department of Education is not qualified to accredit a private school, such as a Bible School, because the DOE is secular and a Bible or Christian School is spiritual thus our standards are not secular and cannot be judged by secular standards!

As we find in 1 Corinthians 2:14 "But the natural man receiveth not the things of the Spirit of God: for they are foolishness unto him: neither can he know them, because they are spiritually discerned." Therefore, a state agency is not able to determine if a spiritually directed learning institution is meeting the mandates of the Bible!

Accreditation has many benefits for both educational institutions and students, but it is neither a guaranty nor is it the sole criterion of an excellent education. Every accredited institution was once unaccredited. For example, Dallas Theological Seminary (DTS) was founded in 1924 but was not accredited by SACS until 1969, long after the graduation of notables such as Dwight Pentecost, Charles Ryrie, and Chuck Swindoll. Dallas Theological Seminary was not accredited by ATS until 1994, but its excellent education before then is unassailable.

ACCREDITATION

Webster's Dictionary defines it as: to give trust or confidence to; to vouch for; to recommend; to furnish with credentials, as an envoy or ambassador. An accreditation commission is like a "watchman on the wall." The main purpose of accreditation is quality assurance. It assures the student that he/she will receive good quality material, grades and records of the courses taken, and a certificate, diploma, or degree upon completion of the program in which they are enrolled. Every accreditation group is not the same.

There are different accrediting groups, focused in different areas of accreditation. We are accredited with the Accrediting Association of Bible Schools and Theological Institutions Inc., National Bible College Association and American Bible Colleges Accreditation which exist to help the religious world to obtain accreditation that is not government affiliated.

The Accrediting Association of Bible Schools and Theological Institutions Inc., National Bible College Association and American Bible Colleges Accreditation sees that quality cannot be finally judged by the size of the student body, the size of the buildings or rich financial endowments.

Students must receive education in a proper climate to receive the quality education they need.

As a member of The Accrediting Association of Bible Schools and Theological Institutions Inc., National Bible College Association and American Bible Colleges Accreditation, we must follow certain criteria's. A few examples of such are:

3. We must have a fair grading policy.

We must be registered in the state with the Post-Secondary Commission. Some states grant religious exemption, and allow Bible colleges to grant Degrees. Other states allow only certificate and diplomas.

Transfer of Credits:

Secondly, we would like to explain the "transfer of credits. Webster's Dictionary defines "transfer" as: .to move from one place to another; to transport; to remove; to pass an impression from one surface to another, as in lithography, photography, etc.; to convey, as property, legally to another.

Concerning the transfer of credits: A student who has studied nursing in college and who has taken all of the courses could not transfer their credits to a college that does not offer nursing. They could transfer some for electives if a college chooses to accept any of those credits. Colleges are not required to accept credits from another college who does not offer the same course of study. You could not go to Bible School and decide to transfer to a liberal arts college to study History and receive any credits transfer. The credits will not transfer to the liberal arts college because they do not have a Bible program.

Every college can accept or reject courses from other colleges. Major colleges do not like to accept credits from schools they consider inferior to their school. Many Bible colleges do not readily accept transfer of credits from other Bible colleges due to denominational and traditional differences. We accept credits from other colleges if the grade is a "C" or above, and if the credits meet the criteria for our

required and elective courses. That is why we evaluate students. We make no guarantee of transfer of credits outside of the Accrediting Association of Bible Schools and Theological Institutions Inc., National Bible College Association and American Bible Colleges Accreditation membership.

This does not mean that other colleges will not accept credits from us. Every college evaluates each student on an individual basis.

Our Purpose:

Thirdly, we want to address "Purpose," in the context of why a student wishes to enroll with us. Students must decide their purpose in wanting to enroll with us.

Our commission is to teach the ordinances and laws of God so that God's people can clearly see the way they should live and the work they must do to build the Kingdom of God. The student's spiritual growth is the most important focus of our college/seminary programs.

RAMBIS has not been designed to provide jobs for the graduates, students, or teachers. It is designed for students to learn. Education is not just for consuming. It is a tool to be used to benefit the Kingdom of God.

Funding:

Each student is responsible for their own school funding. We are not federally nor state funded. We do not receive government grants of any kind. Another question asked pertains to employers paying for schooling. There again it is on an individual basis. Some employers will pay for the schooling if they feel it will benefit their company or help the employee perform their job. If an employer does pay for schooling, the payment is made directly to the student. It is the responsibility of the student to pay their school bill, no matter what their employer pays for. Students should not enroll with us based upon hope of payment from a source other than themselves.
